With a new Government in place a review is taking place of online services, including epetitions. We are committed to improving the e-petitions process and are looking at ways of ensuring that it functions as part of a cohesive approach to public debate and transparent government. A full announcement on how we plan to use these and other services across Government will be made as soon as this important work is completed.

Existing e-petitions, submitted to the previous administration, will not be carried forward to the new administration as part of this process. E-petitions that were live at the time of the election announcement on 6 April, when the e-petitions system was suspended, will therefore not be reopened for signatures. We are issuing responses to petitions that had exceeded the 500 signatures threshold as of 6 April 2010 and these can be viewed on the HMG e-petitions responses page.

We will welcome resubmission on issues of concern to the improved e-petitions system. when it is launched later in 2010.

Web petitions offer a voice, but who's listening?

The public wants its say. Since 10 Downing Street set up its epetitions website, as discussed here a week ago, the blogosphere has become frenetic.

More than 500 petitions have been accepted on the site, attracting hundreds of thousands of visits. But is this any more than a cyberversion of a radio phone-in, or a Commons early day motion, which is then usually ignored?

The site is a big advance on the traditional means of submitting a paper petition to 10 Downing Street. An e-petition is much easier both to start and to sign, hence the burst of activity. The site is in an experimental phase and the Downing Street team and its partner mySociety, a charitable project run by Tom Steinberg, are looking at improvements.

Roads petition breaks a million

More than one million people have signed an online petition against plans to introduce road charging in the UK.

The petition, which is the most popular on the Downing Street website, calls for the scrapping of "planned vehicle tracking and road pricing policy".



Ministers are mulling plans for "pay as-you-drive" scheme

But No 10 has insisted that doing nothing would lead to a 25% increase in congestion "in less than a decade".

The petition was posted by Peter Roberts, from Telford, Shropshire, who said it was an "unfair tax".

Mr Roberts - whose petition broke through the million signature-barrier by 1045 GMT on Saturday - believes charging is unfair on poor people and those who live apart from their families.

He said the numbers signing his petition were "unprecedented".

"There certainly hasn't been an electronic petition that has been this successful. I think it is one of the biggest petitions in history."

Revealed: the e-petition 'prat'

THE Downing Street aide branded a "prat" by a minister for encouraging the public to start official online petitions is Benjamin Wegg-Prosser, a former adviser to Peter Mandelson.

An unlikely combination of the head of Google and Wegg-Prosser are behind Tony Blair's decision to allow petitions on the Downing Street website.

The most popular petition, protesting against government plans to introduce new road charging, is expected to attract almost 2m signatures before it closes on Tuesday.

Despite the mass opposition, Douglas Alexander, the transport secretary, has made it clear it will not persuade him to change the policy.

One anonymous minister, thought to be in the Department for Transport, told a newspaper last week that whoever came up with the petition idea was a "prat". However, friends of Wegg-Prosser, a No 10 aide, claim he is still a backer of the e-petitions and believes they will form a key part of Blair's legacy.

PETITIONS TO LOCAL AUTHORITIES

Electronic petitions

10 Electronic petitions

- A principal local authority must provide a facility for making petitions in electronic form to the authority.
- (2) A principal local authority must give reasons for not granting a request to use the facility provided by it under this section for the making of a petition.
- (3) In this Chapter, "principal local authority" means—
 - (a) a county council in England;
 - (b) a district council in England;
 - (c) a London borough council;
 - (d) the Common Council of the City of London in its capacity as a local authority;
 - (e) the Council of the Isles of Scilly;
 - a county or county borough council in Wales.
- (4) In this Chapter, "e-petition facility" means a facility provided under this section.

UK LESSONS LEARNED - "DOs"

- Leadership from Communications Divisions
- Encourage incremental confidence-building, learning by doing, department by department
- Celebrate successes and draw attention to good work, even if not state-of-the-art
- Protect/defend genuine/measured risk taking
- Encourage sharing of experience and networking within government
- Use established free/commercial services rather than bespoke/in-house

UK LESSONS LEARNED - "DO NOTs"

• Get bogged down in detailed rules:

 Broad policy framework first, more detail and guidance in the light of experience

Make it seem geeky

Acknowledge the leading digerati, but allow others a voice too

Treat this as an IT issue

- Avoid big up-front IT investment
- See access issues as about "tools of the trade"
