Before you give your personal information away, ask:



Why do I have to provide all this information?

Under Queensland's Information Privacy Act 2009, government agencies should only be collecting personal information that is necessary for them to fulfil a function or activity of the agency.

If you are unsure why certain information is requested, contact the agency to discuss your concerns.

How will my information be used?

Will my information be put online?

Queensland's Information Privacy Act 2009 places limits on the capacity of an agency to put your personal information online.

In many cases there will be law permitting the online publication or alternatively, the agency may obtain your agreement to publish your personal information online.

rights?

Queensland's Information Privacy Act 2009 regulates how government agencies collect, store, use and disclose your personal information.

If you consider that an agency has not respected the privacy of your personal information the Information Privacy Act 2009 gives you the right to make a privacy complaint.

You must first contact the agency concerned about your privacy concerns.
